Nevertheless, until this day, the palace keeps the harmony and style that was designed by the Italian architect Joaquín Toesca.


You will know all the history that is hidden in the old walls and emblematic rooms of La Moneda Palace and appreciate its architectural beauty.











This hill in the middle of the city affords one of the most incredible views in Santiago. Especially in winter, after it rains, you can admire a beautiful view of the snow-capped Andes.

The Teleferico-Cable Car will get us over Metropolitan Park, showing us beautiful views of both the city and the surrounding mountains. At the top, you can find the statue of the Virgin Mary, an emblematic monument that you can see from all over the city. Besides, San Cristóbal Hill includes several attractions, such as a landscaped Japanese Garden and two huge public swimming pools. All this and more you will find in Santiago's biggest urban natural area.





It is known as one of the most important and emblematic museums in American culture. The Pre-Columbian Museum, which is in the heart of Santiago's historical center (a block west of Plaza de Armas), has an extensive collection of art, sculptures, jewelry, and various other ancient artifacts. It presents not only Chile's rich cultural past but the past of the Americas as a whole. Inside this venue, objects come to life and tell visitors about the myths, the beliefs, and the customs of the first settlers in America.







Bellavista Neighborhood is an area that lies between the Mapocho River and San Cristóbal Hill in Santiago, Chile. It is known as Santiago's bohemian quarter, with numerous restaurants, boutiques, avant-garde galleries, bars and clubs. Many of the city's intellectuals and artists live in Bellavista, and Pablo Neruda's house in Santiago, La Chascona, is in the district. The area is served by the Baquedano Metro subway station, located across the river to the south.

Bellavista is a popular place to purchase craftwork made from lapis lazuli, a semiprecious stone found principally in Chile and Afghanistan. On weekends, there is an evening handicrafts market that runs the length of Pío Nono. Another attraction is the Santa Filomena Parish also known as the Parroquia de Santa Filomena. The National Zoo of Chile is located at the entrance of San Cristóbal Hill.









